equal-opportunity animal lover, whether it's her Afghan Hounds or the cats and kittens that she helps through Whiskers TNR.

"She is always willing to help out in whatever capacity she can," said Nicole Rhodes, volunteer coordinator for Whiskers. "No job is too big or too small for Suzanne."

That's why we're pleased to feature Suzanne as the first volunteer highlighted this year, someone who shines behind the scenes as well as in the public's eye. She often helps with transportation requests but is also a master at helping plan and execute big events, including our five-year anniversary celebration.

"She anticipates where help is needed during an event and is easily able to step in," said Rhodes. "She utilizes her communication skills to draw people in and teach them about the importance of our mission."

Suzanne brings a wealth of personal knowledge with her, too. She has previous experience with other animal welfare nonprofits, her day job is in pet nutrition, and she tends her own TNR colony, which she describes as her obsession for the past 15 years.

"When one or two stray cats got the word out that my house had food, I found myself doing my own little unofficial TNR program while at the same time working to earn the trust of the cats I was caring for," she explained. "This is where my heart is."

Otherwise, Suzanne's heart is in showing her Afghan Hounds in confirmation and field events several weekends every year. A fan of art and museums as well, she usually tries to find an exhibit to visit while she and her pooches are on the road.

Of course, we're incredibly thankful that all of Suzanne's journeys have led her back to Whiskers TNR,
